For the past 33 years, Science Olympiad has led a revolution in science education. What began as a grassroots assembly of science teachers is now one of the premier science competitions in the nation, providing rigorous, standards-based challenges to 7,600 teams in 50 states. Science Olympiad's ever-changing line-up of events in all STEM

Our school competition was held on May 13th and consisted of a series of individual and team events, which students prepare for during the year. This year about 50 students in grades 3-5 participated gathering materials and practicing at home as well as after school. These challenging and motivational events are well balanced between the various science disciplines of biology, earth science, chemistry, and physics. Events included strong components for problem solving, collaboration, and critical thinking.
